

QUICK GUIDE TO CHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL

San Gabriel and Rio Hondo River Trails.

DESCRIPTION: Schabarum-Skyline Trail is a long connector trail through DIRECTIONS: From the 10 exit at Grand Avenue and open spaces and flood control channels connecting communities from head north for 0.5 miles, turn right on East Covina Hills Covina to Whittier. The trail allows recreational users and commuters to Road, turn right on Oak Canyon Road in 0.2 miles, then connect to a variety of other trails in the area, such as those in the Peter F. make your first left onto East Ranch Creek Road. Take the Schabarum Regional Park and Puente Hills Nature Preserve, as well as the first right onto Oak Canyon Road and continue for 250 feet to the trailhead









SCHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL (SEGMENT A)









DESCRIPTION: The eastern end of this segment of Schabarum-Skyline Trail passes by the Nike Missile Site seated up on the hill overlooking Rose Hills Cemetery and the City of Industry. Traveling west, the trail descends following the paved road to Workman Mill Road and Peck Road pedestrian underpass and the 605. Here, the trail meets the San Gabriel River-Schabarum Connector, which connects to the multiuse trail along the San Gabriel River channel.

SCHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL (SEGMENT B)









DESCRIPTION: The southern end of this segment of Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins on DIRECTIONS: This segment of Schabarum-Skyline Drive with a loop down into the shaded canyon and back up to Skyline Drive. Skyline Trail can be accessed from Turnbull The trail continues north along the ridge on a wide, dirt fire road. Just before Rose
Hills Cemetery and the Nike Missile Site, the trail turns west and begins the descent
down from the ridge. The southern end can be combined with the other piece of the
trail coming down from Turnbull Canyon Road to expand the loop off Skyline Road.



SCHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL (SEGMENT C)

This segment of Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins at the pedestrian underpass at Colima
Road and travels west and north through a utility corridor open space between residential communities. From Colima, the dirt trail starts following a wooded corridor but opens up with less vegetation as it climbs up through the hills north to Turnbull
Canyon.

DIRECTIONS: This segment of Schabarum-Skyline Trail can be accessed from Colima Road, Holmes Circle, Frame Avenue, and Turnbull Canyon Road. These access points of include parking. Street parking is available conventions.

















DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail's eastern end begins in the lower section of Peter F. Schabarum Regional Park. From here the trail climbs up Schabarum Regional Park located off Colima the ridgeline giving panoramic views of the area. After passing the water tower on the western end, the trail begins to descend to Hacienda Road, which it follows to the open space at Draper Road. The trail climbs ups again through oak woodland and Road. These access points do not include parking continues westward though open utility corridor to the underpass at Colima Road.





SCHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL (SEGMENT E)








DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins traveling west DIRECTIONS: This segment of Schabarum-along the flood control channel then follows Larson Street south along the sidewalk Skyline Trail can be accessed from numerous to the end. The trail continues across a rail corridor, through a parking lot and under the 60 to Stoner Creek Road and through the adjacent open space. After passing under Colima Road the trail travels through a residential neighborhood to Peter F. Schabarum Regional Park and continues south along Powder Canyon.









DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail mostly follows the flood control channel/San Jose Creek running south of Valley Boulevard. The channel is concrete and very wide with the paved trail running along the northern bank until Nogales Street where it crosses over to the southern bank. The channel is located behind large industrial warehouse buildings, although most facilities provide a green buffer between their property and the channel.

DIRECTIONS: This segment of Schabarum-Skyline
Trail can be accessed from Valley Boulevard,
Camino de Teodoro, Nogales Street, Fullerton Road
and Lawson Street where the trail is out of the channel.
These access points do not include parking and only
serve as pedestrian and bicycle access to the trail.



SCHABARUM-SKYLINE TRAIL (SEGMENT G)









DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins south of Meadow Pass Road across from Brookside Equestrian Center and runs parallel to Lemon Avenue from numerous points along Lemon Avenue south to Lemon Creek. The trail follows the riparian corridor around the creek to Valley
Boulevard. The section following Lemon Avenue north of La Puente Road is located in
an open space off the road, however the segment between La Puente Road and Lemon
Creek, runs along the sidewalk.

The section following Lemon Creek may be
accessed from Vejar Road or Valley Boulevard.
These access points do not include parking. Street
parking is available on surrounding streets.








DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins south of Grand DIRECTIONS: This segment of Schabarum-Avenue in Walnut. Traveling south, the trail dips mildly into a low valley before Skyline Trail can be accessed from E. Country climbing back up through an open space between residential neighborhoods. After passing the water towers on Arbor Ridge Road, the trail climbs down again, more steeply, and then gradually climbs back up to follow Amar Road. The final piece of the segment follows along Lemon Avenue to Meadow Pass Road.

Hollow Drive and Amar Road. These access points do not include parking and only serve as pedestrian and bicycle access to the trail. Street parking is available on surrounding streets.

DESCRIPTION: This segment of the Schabarum-Skyline Trail begins at the DIRECTIONS: There are numerous street access Antonovich Trail in Covina and passes predominately through an open space points along this segment. 

SAFETY FIRST

HAZARDS ON THE TRAIL



Rattlesnakes occasionally sun themselves in the middle of the trail. If encountered, keep your distance and allow space for the snake to retreat.



Poison oak can be identified by groups of 3 leaves going up the branch. It's best avoided by staying on the trail and wearing long pants and longsleeved shirts to prevent contact with skin.



Ticks are most often found in shaded, grassy areas off the beaten path. Stick to established trails and wear long pants to avoid contact. Check for ticks frequently, especially the scalp, waist and other dark places where they can hide.

SHARE THE TRAIL



When trail conditions require a right of way for safe passage, equestrian users have the primary right of way, hikers next and then mountain bikers. When trail conditions allow and when there is width to safely pass, common courtesy should prevail for all users. Stand to one side of the trail and allow them to pass. When in a group, avoid blocking the trail. Mountain bikers yield to all trail users. Anticipate other trail users as you ride around corners. Mountain bikers traveling downhill must yield to all users, including other mountain bikers, headed uphill. In general, make each pass a safe and courteous one.
